

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In 2024, the Native Hawaiian Center of Excellence...

- Over 500 keiki and 'ōpio were inspired to explore medicine and other healthcare professions through 75 recruitment events.
- Developed 39 Native Hawaiian premedical students to become competitive applicants for health professions schools, with 5 students being accepted this application year. Continued mentorship of 34 students pursuing healthcare fields including attendance at other medical schools, research positions, and as clinical technicians.
- Supported 33 Native Hawaiian medical students at JABSOM, of which 6 successfully graduated with their medical doctorate. Currently supporting 29 Native Hawaiian medical students at JABSOM.
- Trained 100% of JABSOM medical students on the significance of Native Hawaiian values, cultural humility, and medical professionalism.

Queen's Health Systems Contract

The Native Hawaiian Center of Excellence is excited to announce our new partnership with the Queen's Health Systems. Through the *Growing Our Native Hawaiian Physician Workforce* project the Queen's Health Systems is providing NHCOE funding to inspire keiki and 'ōpio to pursue health careers, develop Native Hawaiian premedical students, and mentor Native Hawaiian medical students and physicians to provide the best support for the health needs of our Native Hawaiian communities throughout Hawaii.

With this new opportunity, we are expanding our programming provided to Native Hawaiian pre-medical students who are actively applying for the John A. Burns School of Medicine (JABSOM). Pre-medical students will receive individualized learning support to understand their learning style and how to best achieve on the medical college admissions test (MCAT), culturally tailored mentorship from Native Hawaiian medical students, residents, and practicing physicians.

She is a recent Climate and Health Equity Fellowship graduate, Vice-Chair for the National Council for Asian Pacific Islander Physicians, DEI commissioner for the American Academy of Family Physicians and long time member, and founder of both the Pacific Region Indigenous Doctors Congress and the 'Ahahui o nā Kauka (Association of Native Hawaiian Physicians).
